

Legislative Update February 17, 2023

SECTION 1: GENERAL

I have to admit it was nice to get away from the Capitol today and participate in ICBND's Emerging Leader Winter Session, February Board Meeting, and UND Hockey event in Grand Forks with 60 of your community banking colleagues.

As is customary for this stage of the legislative session, emotions begin to run high with spirited floor debate on controversial issues, many of them social. There are about a dozen bills that seek to restrict health care, activities, and personal expression for transgender residents. Some of those hit the chamber floors this week with lengthy debate. ICBND does not track these bills, but they provide for interesting, and sometimes painful, watching.

Election skepticism also remains alive and well. The legislature is handling dozens of Republican-led election related bills which is a nationwide trend continued from 2021 in the wake of the 2020 presidential election. Many have been acted upon including Senate Bill 2308 which would have banned mail-in balloting. It was defeated 8-38 in the Senate this week. Several election-related bills remain to be voted upon in the waning days before crossover.

As you know, tax relief has been a priority for Governor Burgum and legislative leadership. What form that relief takes has varying opinions. Senator Don Schaible introduced Senate Bill 2066 to provide property tax relief. His original proposal would have reduced property taxes by about 25 percent statewide. The bill was amended and would now provide most taxpayers with about two-thirds of that relief, or about 16.7 percent overall property tax cut. The amended bill received a 42-4 passing vote Wednesday in the Senate. Governor Burgum and others strongly favor income tax relief and are skeptical that property tax relief dollars will actually end up in the property owner's pockets. Legislative leadership has indicated that the ultimate relief will likely be a combination of income and property tax cuts.

Crossover will occur a week from today. Next week's activities will be dominated by floor debates and finalization of appropriations bills. Committee action will be very limited.

SECTION 2: BILL UPDATES FROM ICBND "PRIORITY" TRACKING LIST

HB 1082 – is an expansive 109-page bill brought forth by the Uniform Law Commission which addresses several Uniform Commercial Code amendments. Many of these are related to digital assets which bring certainty, clarity and uniformity as to the definition of "digital assets" and how to perfect security interests in digital assets. The bill was heard in the House Judiciary Committee last week. I testified in support of the bill along with NDBA, and the North Dakota Bar Association. The Committee worked on the bill this week and gave the amended bill a 10-3 "do pass" recommendation Tuesday. It hit the House floor Wednesday and passed by a vote of 84-9. For the life of me, I cannot understand the opposition rationale of those 9 far right "no" votes. Safe to say that conspiracy theories are alive and well this session.

HB 1225 – is a good bill for community banking that had an interesting path to passage in the House. It would require the development of an online portal for electronically accessible statewide property information and property tax information. As reported in testimony, 31 counties already do this. Having access electronically to this information statewide would provide value to community bank lenders and appraisers. The House Appropriations Committee didn't love the idea of the state funding the remaining counties to implement this. As a result, it came out of Committee with a 17-3 "do not pass" recommendation. The full House thought otherwise and passed the bill 48-42 on Monday.

HB 1283 – was the worst of the environmental, social, and governance (ESG) bills for community banks - think "bans on bans". While the intent was to protect the energy industry in North Dakota, the language of the bill was extremely problematic in its reporting and penalty provisions along with the creation of a "blacklist" of banks that may have declined financial services to entities based on reasons other than prescribed in the bill. For example, a credit decision based on character could trigger a reporting event and potential blacklisting. The bill meant to target woke megabanks, but it missed the mark. Fortunately, the House Industry, Business and Labor Committee gave the bill a 12-1 "do not pass" recommendation last week during Committee work. For the second day in a row, HB 1283 was laid over one calendar day so it will hopefully be killed on the floor Monday.

HB 1429 – is a bit of a "catch all" ESG bill that was worked on in the House Industry Business and Labor Committee Monday. We don't have concerns with this bill as amended but we need to keep a close eye on it throughout this legislative session. It will be voted on in the chamber next week.

HB 1469 – is another ESG bill that sought to blacklist financial institutions from being able to have public funds invested with them if that financial institution promoted any political, social, environmental, ideological, or other nontraditional goal or standard that conflicts with the state's energy or agriculture industries. Here's the problem – as defined by whom? And of course, we don't believe blacklisting banks is the answer to pretty much anything. Community banks support ag and energy every day. We opposed the bill. The House Industry, Business and Labor Committee took this bill up in Committee last week and gave it a 8-5 "do not pass" recommendation. Like HB 1283, this bill was also laid over for the second day in a row. I expect spirited floor debates on both of these bills next week which were both brought by Representative Anna Novak.

HB 1487 – is a gun and ammunition tracking bill that would prohibit specific tracking of gun and ammunition purchases. This would broadly apply to entities including financial institutions and the others in the payment card chain. We testified in opposition to the original bill language as it was problematic to community banks. ICBND and others were heavily involved in amending the bill. As amended, we did not oppose the bill. The amended bill received a 11-2 "do pass" recommendation from the House IBL Committee on Wednesday. Interestingly, the retail lobby did not engage on this bill, and I think they potentially have the most adverse exposure.

HB 1505 – would prohibit employers and others from requiring any form of vaccination for its employees. We viewed this as an infringement on employers' rights and opposed the bill. It received a 9-5 "do not pass" recommendation from the House Human Services Committee and was defeated on the House floor Wednesday by a 31-60 vote.

HB 1527 – sought to force unnecessary burdens on employers in determining an employee's immigration status and would have required employers use E-verify. This legislation would only apply to private employers. It was a bad bill brought by Representative Matt Heilman. We oppose the bill, and it received a 13-0-1 "do not pass" from the House Industry, Business and Labor Committee and failed on the House floor late last week by a 5-88 vote.

SB 2333 – would allow for annual legislative sessions although the total number of legislative days cannot exceed the 80 days per biennium. It received a 5-1 "do pass" recommendation from its policy committee and a 9-7 "do pass" from Senate Appropriations. After a lengthy floor debate, it received a 21-26 failing vote. Thank goodness!!
