



Legislative Update April 9, 2021

SECTION 1: GENERAL

Hope that the 67th Assembly of the North Dakota Legislature would save up to 10 days of the constitutional maximum 80 days has dwindled already and now the estimate is closer to four days that they could use to meet in the interim for redistricting, veto overrides, or fiscal unknowns to name a few. If that estimate is correct, we still have nearly three weeks of session left.

Policy committee work is done and now the focus is on appropriations issues and conference committee activities. Also, next week will begin “two-a-day” floor sessions. Historically, floor sessions have occurred as often as three times per day but that’s not the plan as of yet. Bills are beginning to get signed by the governor. As a refresher, signed bills become law at varying times. Appropriations bills go into effect July 1 of the odd-numbered years, policy bills take effect August 1 and any bills that pass with an emergency clause attached become law effective upon filing with the secretary of state following the governor’s signature. In order for an emergency clause to carry, it must receive a two-thirds majority approval by each chamber.

Mask mandates were of prominent debate again this week with HB 1323 coming before the Senate. Demonstrators gathered Monday outside the North Dakota Capitol cheering support for the bill which sought to ban the state or any local governments in North Dakota from mandating an individual to wear a face mask, face shield or other face covering. The measure narrowly passed the House in February on a 50-44 vote even though it came out of the House Political Subdivisions Committee with a “Do Not Pass” recommendation. The problem with the bill in the opinion of ICBND many other business lobby groups is that the broad language of the measure removed the rights of businesses to mandate safety equipment within their operations. Our opposition to the bill was not for political reasons but simply for preserving employers’ rights relative to the health and safety of employees and customers. As presented on the Senate Floor Wednesday, the bill was likely to fail due to those business concerns. However, Senator Jessica Bell offered an amendment on the Senate Floor to ensure business rights were protected. The amendment was accepted and the amended bill passed 37-10. As passed, the bill would prohibit the governor and state health officer from issuing a statewide mask mandate. I’m quite certain we haven’t heard the last of this bill. If by chance the House were to concur with the Senate version, this seems ripe for a veto by the governor.

Many legislators felt jilted this last year by not having a voice in how the federal CARES Act money was spent by the state. The introduction of SB 2218 was at least partially the result of this. As introduced by Senator Brad Bekkedahl (who also happens to be my cousin...sometimes the family trees don’t really “fork” if you’re from Williston like he and I are), the bill sought to allow the legislature to meet in short session in even-numbered years. Opponents stated that there’s at least one other bill that’s being tweaked to more appropriately address the issue. The bill which obviously already passed the Senate was defeated fairly soundly 68 to 25 on the House Floor.

And finally, yesterday was a big day as HB 1425 was signed by the governor in the Great Hall. This is a great bill that will facilitate investment of Legacy Fund dollars in and through North Dakota companies including qualified trust and wealth management entities.

SECTION 2: OTHER BILL UPDATES FROM ICBND “PRIORITY” TRACKING LIST

HB 1175 – is the bill that provides liability protections for business from Covid-related claims. As I reported numerous times, we strongly support this measure along with a coalition of other business, healthcare and manufacturing concerns. The bill landed in conference committee due to some minor language issues that needed to be addressed. The conference committee met Wednesday afternoon and approved the minor changes which are acceptable to us and the coalition. It’s now on its way back to the chambers for concurrence. Sometimes it’s a long and winding road!

HB 1231 – was turned into a “shall consider” study measure that would, in the interim, direct legislative management to study the benefits of investing Legacy Funds locally before investing moneys outside the state. ICBND supported the original bill and still supports the study as we’ve advocated for this concept for years. It passed 42-5 on the Senate Floor Monday.


HB 1431 – is the surviving bonding bill. I reported previously that the Senate was deviating from the \$680 million House version with amendments that added another \$400 million to the bill. Well, those amendments were dismissed on the Senate Floor yesterday as Senators voted unanimously to pass the bonding package in the same form the House backed in February. The measure is headed to the governor’s desk.

SB 2008 – is the Department of Financial Institution’s Budget which was finally acted on in the House Appropriations Committee Wednesday. ICBND approves of the bill in its amended format and the Committee gave it a unanimous “Do Pass” recommendation. The House approved the amended bill 90-3 on Monday but the amendment stripped the bill of line-item transfer authority. The Senate did not concur with the amendment so this bill is on its way to conference committee.

SB 2101 – is DFI’s bill to modernize some banking statutes and replace outdated language. Among other things, it would allow the department to carryover all funds from biennium to biennium rather than turn back any excess over 20 percent to the General Fund. None of these funds should ever have to go to the General Fund. It would also allow for semi-annual (rather than annual) assessments. Importantly, it provides some flexibility (at least in the way of credit ratings) for banks to invest in corporate bonds and it allows for expanded investment in service corporations (United States vs. just North Dakota). It seems like it was a lifetime ago that we first testified in support of this bill (1st week of January). After passing in the Senate, it was amended in the House to add an emergency clause so it came back to the Senate this week and received a 47-0 passing vote.

HCR 3024 – as drafted was a concurrent resolution directing legislative management to consider studying the feasibility and desirability of regulating special purpose depository institutions, also referred to as SPDIs. SPDI institutions are banks that receive deposits and conduct other incidental activities including fiduciary management, custody and related activities. SPDIs seem to be heavily focused on digital assets. This resolution was amended in the House to more broadly consider studying regulating other entities engaged in virtual currency business activities. The Senate IBL Committee on Wednesday gave the measure a 5-1 “Do Not Pass” recommendation with the sentiment being that such a process is already under way and a study resolution is unnecessary. The resolution failed on the Senate Floor Tuesday on a voice vote.
